# ETHICS APPROVAL PROCESSES IN THE PACIFIC

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#### INTRODUCTION

In an effort to improve capacity within the sector to undertake effective and ethical development research, RDI Network has mapped the processes of obtaining ethics approval for research in developing countries across the Pacific. Meeting the relevant ethics approval requirements in-country is essential for the integrity of the conducting of and products resulting from research projects.

This document is designed to be used as a guidance by any researcher who intends to undertake research involving human participants (such as surveys or interviews) within any of the nine Pacific countries covered by this document. Organisations may also find this information useful, as it provides a starting point in which to begin seeking ethics approval for their own research.

The following pages outline step-by-step processes for obtaining ethics approval in the Cook Islands, Fiji, Kiribati, the Marshall Islands, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, the Solomon Islands, and Vanuatu. When possible, links to relevant application forms have been provided, as well as websites and contact details for acquiring additional information.

The use of ethics review processes in-country by researchers based in Australia should complement the appropriate ethics approval requirements of Australian regulations and institutions.

#### **DISCLAIMER**

While all efforts have been taken to ensure the accuracy of this information, it is recommended that researchers do their own fact checking at the time of application, as information can change quickly. The advice provided should be considered as unofficial and is to be used as guidance only.

As information within governments can change quickly, RDI Network recommends that researchers check with the contacts provided to ensure that these approval processes remain current at the time of application.

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## **COOK ISLANDS**



## STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- While there is no centralised agency, the National Research Committee, Office of the Prime Minister, issues
  research permits.
- Guidelines for conducting research in the Cook Islands can be found <u>here</u>.
- Applications must be submitted to the committee at least three months prior to intended departure date. Approved applications will be able to pick up permit on arrival.
- A copy of the application form can be found <u>here</u>.
- The completed application form, a letter of recommendation, current CV, and passport copy are to be sent to:

#### FIJI




#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- There are two Ethics Review Committees who issue research permits: the College Health Research Ethics Review Committee at the Fiji National University's College of Medicine, Nursing, and Health Services; and the Fiji National Health Research Ethics Review Committee at the Ministry of Health.
- Applications are individually reviewed once received. Although processing times may vary, the standard turnaround is one-two weeks.
- As applications are processed online, researchers must create an account on the Fiji Health Research Portal: <a href="http://www.health.gov.fi/fijihrp/index.php?journal=hrp&page=user&op=register">http://www.health.gov.fi/fijihrp/index.php?journal=hrp&page=user&op=register</a>.
- To complete the application, the following documents must be uploaded into the portal:
  - Complete research proposal with abstract
  - Questionnaires/data collection form, consent form, and information sheet Current CV
  - Overseas researchers need to provide proof of collaboration with a local institution and local co-investigator

- Within 12 months of completed research, one hard copy and one soft copy (along with all de-identified raw data used for final analysis) must be sent to the Ministry of Health.

#### **KIRIBATI**



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- The Ministry of Internal and Social Affairs issues research permits for cultural/anthropological related research.
- Applications are individually reviewed once received. Although processing times may vary, the standard turnaround is one - two weeks.
- A copy of the application form can be found here.
- The completed application form, one page research proposal, and current CV to be sent to:



- Upon acceptance of the research permit, the researcher needs to advise the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of their intention to visit and to obtain a visa. - Within two months of the research being completed, two copies of the published material must be submitted the Kiribati Cultural Centre and Museum. More information on this will be provided as part of the research approval process.

#### MARSHALL ISLANDS



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- The Historical Preservation Office issues research permits for anthropological related research.
- Committees are formed to assess applications as they are received. As such, it is recommended that applications are made well in advance of the intended start date. Processing times vary depending on how many applications are received, and how long it takes committee to form, but standard turnaround is two-four weeks.

- Upon completion of the research, two hard copies and one soft copy of final report/thesis (along with all data collected within the Marshall Islands) must be submitted to the HPO. The deadline in which this data needs to be submitted will be determined through the application process.

#### PAPUA NEW GUINEA



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- Approval from both the Institute of Medical Research Institutional Review Board, and the Medical Research Advisory Committee is required for all research involving human participants.
- Guidelines for conducting research in Papua New Guinea can be found at: http://www.pngimr.org.pg/irb/protocol\_approvs.htm.
- Applications are only reviewed on a bi-monthly basis when the Committee meets. As such, turnaround times vary depending on when the application is submitted. #### **SAMOA**



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- There is no centralised agency in Samoa. All ministries have their own ethics research committee, procedures, and policies. To undertake research with human participants, it is recommended that researchers seek approval through the Samoa Health Research Committee of the Ministry of Health.
- Applications are individually reviewed once received. Processing times may vary, and are dependent on research content and the number of ministries involved. However, the standard turnaround is between two weeks and three months.
- To apply, a letter requesting to conduct research in Samoa, research proposal, and ethics approval from the researcher's university or institution should to be sent to:



#### SOLOMON ISLANDS



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- The Ministry of Education and Human Resources Development issues all research permits.
- Applications are only reviewed once a quarter, when the Research Committee meets. As such, turnaround times vary depending on when application is submitted. It is recommended that applications are submitted well in advance to allow for this.
- Prior to starting the application, it is highly recommended that the researcher ensures that they meet the application criteria, which can be found at: <a href="http://www.mehrd.gov.sb/">http://www.mehrd.gov.sb/</a>.
- Depending on the nature of the intended research, researchers may be required to obtain a separate provincial research permit in addition to the national research permit. As such, it is recommended that researchers contact the Ministry of Education and Human Resources Development via email prior to submitting their application. 

# STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- The National Health Ethics and Research Committee issues ethics approval for all research.
- Applications are usually reviewed quarterly or bi-monthly, however these meetings are flexible. The standard turnaround time is two three months.

#### **VANUATU**



#### STEPS IN RESEARCH APPROVAL

- The Vanuatu National Cultural Council issues research permits for cultural related research.
- Processing times vary dependent on how application is submitted; i.e. in person or via post. Standard turnaround is two four weeks. Continuous follow up is strongly recommended for timely processing.
- Prior to starting the application, it is highly recommended that the researcher reads the Vanuatu Cultural Research Policy, which can be found <a href="here">here</a>.
- A copy of the application form can be found <u>here</u>.
- The completed application form and letter of endorsement from the affiliated university or organisation guaranteeing that researcher will comply with policy conditions, is to be sent to:

If the researcher is not affiliated with a recognised university or organisation, a refundable Vatu \$40,000.00 fee is to be paid to ensure compliance.
